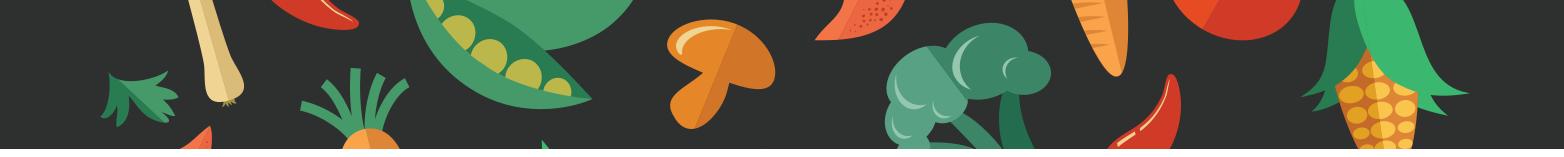

DONOR SPOTLIGHT

The Regina Food Bank is a charitable community reached people across Saskatchewan through a based organization working to eliminate hunger and food insecurity through nutritious food In addition to the online course, 385 participants distribution, education, and support programs in partnership and cooperation with the community.

We focus on six strategic priorities: acquiring and distributing food; providing learning opportunities; community partnerships; organizational sustainability; serving as the collective voice of the hungry and increasing community awareness.

Serving Regina since 1982, we continue to meet the needs of Regina's most food insecure. Last vear we collected and distributed 3,218,435 pounds of food and non-food products (valued at \$8,367,931 through Food Bank Canada's valuation of \$2.60 per pound) to fulfill 87,356 client requests and support a network of 121 local community partners.

Our work would not be possible if it were not for the caring commitment found within our community. One of our strong supporters, Hill JDC West, has provided support to the Regina Food Bank since 2012. In addition to the 268 hours in service to the Regina Food Bank last year alone, the 52 students provided a total of 3,590 volunteer hours to our community. We are proud to have the support of such an amazing group that exemplifies the values of JDC West: it began 15 years ago, the event has raised hard-working, giving back to your community, and teamwork in our community and at the annual event involving thousands of future business leaders.

This year we wrapped up a third successful year for two signature programs; our Nutritional Cooking Leadership Program and our online and in-person Personal Financial Management Workshops, both sponsored by Conexus Credit Union. As a result of this partnership, 160 clients participated in the Nutritional Cooking Leadership Program and developed new skills in the kitchen, a new repertoire of healthy recipes to prepare at home, and the confidence to continue try new foods and recipes on an ongoing basis. Our Personal Financial Management Workshops 381

custom developed online self-study workshop. completed our 16 hour in-class workshop which provides an in-depth exploration of key topics related to budgeting, banking, credit & debt and consumerism. In October we were pleased to embark on a renewed partnership with Conexus Credit Union with a new Lifestyles Series Workshop for 2019 incorporating the best of previous workshops supplemented by other programs including Mental Health First Aid, RESP sign-up events, grocery store tours and more!

In 2014, Sherwood Co-Op launched a new event in support of the Regina Food Bank – Fuel up to Feed. Donating 10¢ per lite sold, and brining on Federated Co-Op as a matching partner since 2015 the event has raised more than 1.5 million meals since then. Last year a record \$72,365.40 was raised during the Fuel up to Feed event. Sherwood Co-Op continues to be an excellent steward of Food Bank resources through the sponsorship of our Virtual Food Drive platform, and in helping us stretch donation dollars further when it comes to purchasing food for our Christmas Hampers.

Farm Credit Canada continues to support Food Banks and feeding programs across Canada with their Drive Away Hunger program. Since more than 45 million meals for individuals and families experiencing hunger and food insecurity throughout Canada. In 2018 Farm Credit Canada raised 387,647 meals for individuals and families experiencing hunger and food insecurity in Regina and 776,908 meals throughout Saskatchewan. Farm Credit Canada is a true leader in the fight against hunger; catalyzing the involvement of schools, businesses and community to raise foods and funds across Canada.

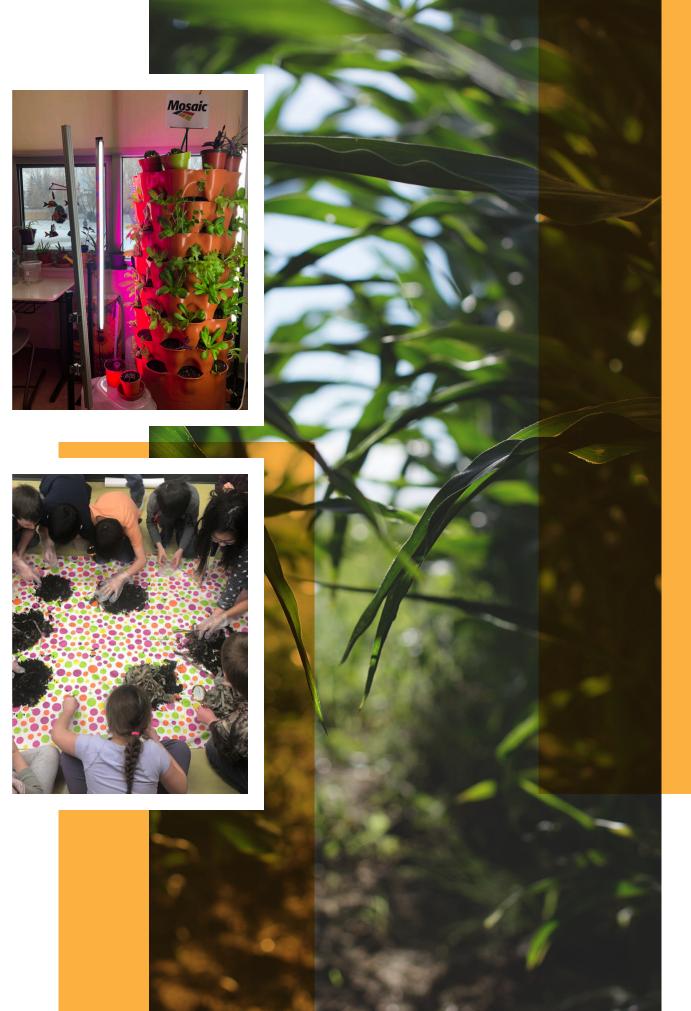
URBAN AGRICULTURE PROJECT

Food connects us all and all too often, our only connection to food is as a finished product.

It has been recognized that there has been a loss of knowledge about how to grow food, or even where our food comes from- other than the supermarket. The Four Season Urban Agriculture Project at the Regina Food Bank seeks to deepen the connection people have with the food they consume.

In partnership with the Mosaic Company, the program launched its second annual campaign of the Urban Agriculture School Outreach Project to 24 locations in September 2018. In addition to these school partners, we have four community outreach partners. Each participating partner received a toolkit that included a Garden Tower, grow lights, soil, seeds, red wiggler worms for composting along with other accessories needed to grow food in their classrooms and organizations all year long.

Plans are already in motion for next years roll out. We look forward to inspiring more people in our community to harvest knowledge, build relationships with their neighbours and engage in community gardening to build a robust and abundant future for each other and our children.
